Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2021-22 educational progress for Old Mission Peninsula School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. For the 2021-22 school year, schools were identified based on prior years' performance using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup in 2021-22. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that had a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2021-22. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or has a graduation rate at or below 67% in 2021-22. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school has not been given one of these labels.

Principal Overview:

Old Mission Peninsula School is a kindergarten through fifth grade public charter school. OMPS currently has an enrollment of approximately 178, including preschool. The school employs 11 classroom teachers, 2 licensed preschool teachers, 1 special education teacher, 1 counselor, 1 teacher in music, 1 PE teacher, 1 art teacher, and 5 support staff assistants. OMPS has the benefit of having the support from the Intermediate School District by providing the school with a social worker, occupational therapist, speech and language pathologist, and psychologist. OMPS also has a high level of support from community volunteers and a strong parent teacher organization. The school's free and reduced lunch population is approximately 9%. OMPS is designated as a school by choice and therefore the

attendance encompasses a large and economically diverse area in the Grand Traverse County. Approximately 3% of our students are ELL.

Key challenges are in academic instances. Our students are demonstrating lower than expected in the areas of Math and Social Studies. We continue to analyze the curriculum and student data in order to make informed decisions to better help students achieve greater growth. Math intervention is a daily occurrence for students who need extra assistance, as well as having our teachers continuously be coached by a math professional from the ISD.

State law requires that we also report additional information.

PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL:

Families choose OMPS for an alternative to traditional public school. The school is open to any student in the state of Michigan. Students are placed in a grade upon registration. The school board places a cap on seat enrollment. Once the cap has been reached, students are placed on a waiting list.

THE STATUS OF 3-5 YEAR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN:

The School Improvement Plan at OMPS continues to work on improvements within the school's educational goals of making growth in student achievement in the areas of Math and Reading. Data meetings are held after each benchmark assessment (fall, winter, spring) to analyze growth and adjust interventions and resources based on student need. We believe that each student can achieve growth at their individual level.

We use Common Knowledge Language Arts for ELA, Math Expressions for Math, and TCI for Social Studies. Science is FOSS which aligns to the Next Generation Science Standards.
